**From the Pastor's Desk**

How do Lutherans observe Lent? That has been an open question for Lutherans in different times and places. Should Lutherans participate in fasting during Lent, or "give up something"?

For a long time, many Lutherans made a point of being "not Catholic." There was a time when even using ashes on Ash Wednesday would have been seen as "too Catholic" for some Lutherans. I think the pendulum has swung back the other way a bit, and Lutherans today have a greater interest in many of the historic practices of the church. We will, of course, have ashes on Ash Wednesday, and some Lutherans might choose to observe Lenten fasting, whether that is abstaining from meat on Fridays, or from some other sort of food or practice throughout the 40 days of Lent. That's fine, so long as it is understood rightly. The Augsburg Confession, the founding statement of what Lutherans believe, says quite a bit about this topic, but I think one sentence near the end of Article XXVI gives a good summary: "So, fasting in itself is not rejected. Instead, we reject making it a required service with prescribed days and food, for this confuses consciences."

Do you *have to* fast in some way during Lent? Certainly not! Can it be a useful spiritual practice? Certainly! Lent is a time of preparation, of focusing on the cross, and on what God the Son has done for the world—emptying himself even to the point of death, out of love for the world. For some people, fasting can be a helpful way to focus on that, a spiritual discipline that points us to Christ. But there are other ways to include intentional spiritual practices during Lent.

Maybe, rather than giving up some *thing*, like a kind of food, it is worthwhile to give up some time. Lent might be a time to spend a few extra hours in prayer and meditation, or in reading scripture. Or maybe you'll want to take that time and give it up for the sake of others, volunteering at a local shelter, or feeding ministry, or Habitat for Humanity project, or children's literacy program—there are so many needs in our community, and there are ways for *anyone* to volunteer and help others, regardless of age or ability (if you would like suggestions or help connecting to volunteer opportunities, please talk to me). Or, maybe you want to give your time to a particular issue, advocating for justice on behalf of others. Maybe you will choose to set aside a portion of your income for a particular organization or cause. There are so many possibilities; I encourage you to think about what might be a useful spiritual practice for you during Lent. Just as we each are given different spiritual gifts from God, we each practice our spirituality in different ways.

So, again, how do Lutherans observe Lent? The short answer might be "with Christian freedom." Because we have been set free in Jesus Christ, we are free to do acts of love, in service to God and to one another.

### St. Paul's Budget Meeting—December 28, 2017:

Present were Richard Bradley, Marty Bormann, Bruce Bormann, Julie Bormann, Gloria Heacock, Ruth Hingtgen, Chad Uhlenhake, Doug Clark, and Pastor Will Layton.

Meeting was called to order by President Marty Bormann at 6:42 p.m. at Pastor's Office. Pastor Will opened with a prayer.

Julie Bormann read the October 8, 2017 Council Meeting secretary's report.

2017 treasurer's report—Ruth stated that she needed authorization to pay the benevolence and what amount she should pay. Motion carried to pay \$1,000 benevolence.

2018 Church budget changes—Travel was changed from \$1,200 to \$1,000, Pension was \$7,500 changed to \$7,000, and Worship and Local Expenses was changed from \$2,100 to \$2,000. Pastor Will Layton discussed giving more for benevolence.

#### Old business:

- Discussed Marty Bormann taking down cedar tree.
- Marty Bormann and Doug Clark might work on roping the windows in the near future.

#### New business:

- \$5,000 was anonymously donated as seed money to help build a bathroom for the church. It was deposited into the church general fund account. The donor wanted the check to clear in the 2017 calendar year. Discussion was made about the size and placement of the bathroom and if we wanted an addition or a free standing building. Also, if the size would be just a bathroom or an additional meeting room or a possible space for Pastor Will to work in. Also discussed the cost of adding sewer and water to the church and other additional expenses what would occur with having a bathroom addition. Pastor Will Layton discussed the possibility of having an emergency food pantry included in the addition and the possibility of getting a grant for that. Richard Bradley stated that the east wall (alter wall) is not in very good shape. Gloria Heacock stated there is a pauper cemetery located somewhere on the church property, so we needed to take that into consideration.
- Motion carried that Pastor Will Layton, Bruce Bormann and Chad Uhlenhake get a bid for an addition and Doug Clark will check into the cost of sewer and water connection. We will call a congregational meeting when we have our bids.

- Mark Felderman was nominated for church council.
- Joint service in the park is tentatively scheduled for August 19, 2018.
- Church breakfast in the park is tentatively scheduled for June 10, 2018. We will have worship on Saturday, June 9, at 7:30 p.m.
- Church cleaning date will be set at the annual meeting.
- On Sunday, June 3, 2018 our church worship time will switch to 8:30 am.
- Bible school dates and Fall fundraiser date and organization will be discussed at the annual meeting. on Sunday, January 21, after worship.
- Pastor Will Layton wondered about sending letters to members about the annual meeting date. Marty Bormann suggested the possibility of having mailboxes in the back of church. Chad Uhlenhake wanted to know how many members do we have that don't attend on a regular bases. Our total confirmed membership count is 48. Pastor Will Layton, Gloria Heacock, and Marge Felderman are going to work on making an updated current membership list.

Meeting adjourned at 8:12 p.m.
