From the Pastor's Desk

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Last year, when the April Parish Twine came out, it was already Easter. This year, we still have a few weeks left in Lent. Have you ever wondered why Easter is on a different day each year?

Early in the history of the church, Christians decided that Easter would be celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox. Because of that, we can end up celebrating Easter anywhere between March 22nd and April 25th. That might seem like an overly complicated way to set a date for something, but it comes from a Christian interpretation of the way the Jewish people set the date of Passover (although it doesn't always coincide exactly with Jewish Passover, for reasons that are too complicated to get into in a brief article). You might also be aware that not all Christians celebrate Easter on the same date every year. Members of the Orthodox Church use an older version of the calendar that we use. While the western church, and eventually most of the world, adopted our modern calendar starting in the 16th century, the Orthodox have a strong tendency to stick to old ways, and that includes using an older version of the calendar. Because some years the equinox according to both their reckoning and ours happens before the same full moon, sometimes Easter falls on the same date for both traditions. This year, though, our Orthodox sisters and brothers will celebrate Easter a week later than we will, on April 28th. If you wanted, you could visit St. Elias Church in Dubuque that Sunday and celebrate Easter two weeks in a row!

Although we might not all celebrate Easter on the same day, the wonderful good news that we celebrate is exactly the same: that Jesus is risen from the dead, and because of that fact we know that even death no longer has power over us. We who have been joined in baptism to Jesus' death are joined to Jesus' resurrection. That is a promise from God, and it is worth celebrating! Our Easter celebrations will begin with the Easter Vigil at St. John's. As I mentioned last year, this follows the ancient idea of considering a new day to beginning at sunset, rather than midnight-the same reason that we begin our Christmas celebrations at Christmas Eve. The Easter Vigil is one of the most ancient and solemn services of the church year. Although the Vigil service became less common among recent generations, many churches have begun to revive this ancient service with its powerful imagery of light triumphing over darkness and death giving way to life. For the third year in a row, the Easter Vigil will also include the sacrament of Holy Baptism, as Mckayla Martens will be welcomed into the church and joined to Christ in her baptism that evening. I hope you will join us in celebrating Christ's resurrection at the Vigil of Easter, Saturday, April 20th at 7:30 p.m. at St. John's and Easter Sunday at 8:30 a.m. at St. Paul's or 10:00 a.m. at St. John's. You can find the full schedule of Holy Week and Easter Services elsewhere in this newsletter. Each of those services plays a unique role in telling the story of salvation. I can't wait to worship together with all of you!

Explosion Trinity Lutheran, Burlington

Bereavement Support Group

It will be open to anyone in the tri-state area who has experienced the loss of a loved one, through death, within the past twelve months. It is suggested that participants wait at least three months after a loss before attending.

The group will meet on Tuesday evenings, 6:00 -8:00 p.m., beginning April 16 through May 21, at the Hospice of Dubuque office in the Theisen Education Center, 1670 JFK Road. There is no requirement to have had a previous connection with Hospice of Dubuque. The sessions are meant to be both educational and emotionally supportive. To ensure you receive the greatest benefit from this group, attendance at each session is strongly encouraged. Group size is limited so pre-registration is required by April 9. Please contact the hospice office at (563) 582-1220 for a registration form. Though there is no fee for the group, a contribution to defray the cost of materials would be appreciated.

National Child Abuse Prevention Month

According to the Iowa Department of Human Services, 8,558 Iowa children were found to be abused in 2017. The most common forms of abuse included denial of critical care, physical injury, exposure to illegal drugs and sexual abuse.

Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) helps combat child abuse through prevention, safety, and stability services, as well as mental and behavioral health treatment. Through regular in-home visits to families, LSI's Early Child-hood Services prevent child abuse by giving parents the support, education, and resources they need to build a healthy, stable home for their children. In 2018, our Early Childhood programs provided more than 14,000 in-home visits to families.

LSI's Family Safety, Risk, and Permanency Services help children and families already involved in a crisis or abuse situation to become safer and more stable, and LSI's Bremwood and Beloit Residential Treatment Centers serve many children and youth who have experienced trauma from past abuse or neglect.

A Life-Changing Service

Amanda felt helpless when her children were removed from their home. She and her husband, Nathan, struggled with substance use, and they could no longer provide a safe environment for their children. But with help from LSI's Family Safety, Risk, and Permanency Services, Amanda has overcome every obstacle to build a future she only dreamed possible.

LSI connected Amanda and Nathan to parenting and sobriety resources in their community, and their LSI worker, Katie, helped them schedule regular visits with their children. Knowing Katie was there to cheer them on, even on the bad days, the couple was determined to beat their addiction. It was time to turn their lives around and fight for their family.

Amanda and Nathan recently celebrated two years of sobriety, and all three of their children have returned home. Amanda now also collaborates with the Iowa child welfare system and organizations like LSI to support more families in need of the same care she received. "I'm grateful that Katie and LSI were a part of our lives. They weren't there to hinder, they were there to help," Amanda says. "I feel accomplished, and I feel really good about where my family is at in our lives. Now I'm just happy to help other families achieve their goals and realize they are not alone."
