From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends in Christ,

Easter will not be canceled. I don't exactly know what I mean yet when I say that. I wish I could say that I expected to able to gather together for worship in the way that we normally do, but I was also given the charge at my ordination of "giving no occasion for false security or illusory hope." In the spirit of that, you should know that it is very unlikely that things are going to be back to "normal" by Easter—absent a miracle, I should say. Right now I am working hard to figure out alternative ways that we might still gather in one place while still following restrictions on gatherings. I know some churches have hosted "drive-in" services, and I am looking into whether that might be an option for us. We will share information about any worship plans as they develop via the church Facebook page, website, and on the phone tree. We are also sending out weekly announcements via email. Please contact Marge if you would like to receive those announcements to those who desire them. Again, please contact Marge for that.

I wish I could give a clearer answer about what the future would hold, but it seems the Lord has given me other gifts instead of prophesy. As quickly as the news has been changing lately, I am not confident in saying that things will happen in a certain way. Yet I am confident in standing by the statement at the beginning of this newsletter: Easter will not be canceled. No matter what, whether we connect with one another in person, or strictly through means of technology, phone calls, letters, and prayers, Easter will not be canceled. Easter *is* going to happen in the midst of all this.

We do not need everything to be good or even "normal" to celebrate the Resurrection. The Resurrection is not true only on sunny days when we experience good health and prosperity. The Resurrection is true in the midst of the Valley of the Shadow of Death. The Resurrection is true at the side of the open grave. The Resurrection is true even in the depths of Hell itself.

And the Resurrection has been true for Christians throughout the ages, through the best times and the worst times. We can remember that the disciples spent that first Easter scared, locked in a room, not sure what the future would hold. You know what? The Good News still made it to that room, first through the witness of the brave and faithful women who first heard that Good News at the tomb. Then Jesus himself showed up in that room. He told them, "Do not be afraid!" and showed them that life had triumphed over death. But that would not be the last time that Jesus showed up among scared people facing hard times. Christians in the early church, persecuted by Roman authorities, gathered in homes and shared Jesus' Good News with one another. That continued to hold true, as Christians throughout the centuries continued to bear witness to Jesus in the face of persecution and plagues. This is far from the first time Christians will have to gather in homes to hear God's Word and experience Jesus' presence. Even in living memory, Christians have done so.

We can do it, too, continuing to tell the story of how life triumphs over death, and continuing to be Christ's presence for one another through acts of love and kindness

National Child Abuse Prevention Month

According to the Iowa Department of Human Services, 8,967 Iowa children were subject to abuse or neglect in 2018. The most common forms of abuse included denial of critical care, physical injury, exposure to illegal drugs or dangerous substance, and sexual abuse.

Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) helps combat child abuse through prevention, safety, and stability services, as well as mental and behavioral health care. Through regular in-home visits to families, LSI's Early Childhood Services prevent child abuse by giving parents the support, education, and resources they need to build a healthy, stable home for their children. In 2019, our Early Childhood programs provided more than 11,000 in-home visits to families.

LSI's Family Safety, Risk, and Permanency Services help children and families already involved in a crisis or abuse situation to become safer and more stable, and LSI's Bremwood and Beloit Residential Treatment Centers serve many children and youth who have experienced trauma from past abuse or neglect. Jaqashia is now the proud mother of a baby boy, A'Kani, and she is determined to be the best parent she can be. Pam still stops by for her regular visits but now, Jaqashia feels ready to raise her son in a safe and loving home. "LSI made a huge difference. They made a big positive change," Jaqashia says. "I feel very confident that I can actually raise my son now, and I have my own place. I'm feeling great."
