From the Pastor's Desk

One of the most important things that Jesus does throughout the gospels is eating with people. Throughout his ministry, you find people noticing and commenting on who Jesus decided to share a meal with. In Luke 15, we find the Pharisees and scribes grumbling about Jesus and saying, "This fellow welcomes tax collectors and sinners." On the night just before Jesus was betrayed and arrested, he had a meal—a Passover meal—with his disciples, and instituted the holy meal that's still central to our Christian worship, Holy Communion. And after he was raised from the dead, the first couple of times that he appeared to his disciples, he ate with them.

In a few days, we start the season of Lent, and on the first Sunday of Lent we always hear the story of Jesus alone, in the wilderness, fasting. It's completely the opposite of all of those meals that he shared with people. On the one hand, that story supports a lot of the traditional Lenten practices of fasting. On the other hand, the stories of Jesus eating with people really remind me of one of my favorite traditions during Lent: soup suppers!

It's been a couple of years since we have been able to eat together, and I'm excited to be able to do it again. Getting together for a meal isn't just about feeding our physical bodies. It's about fellowship with one another. Breaking bread together is an important part of being the body of Christ together. Of course we do that whenever we share Holy Communion with one another, and I certainly don't mean to minimize that. But if we are looking to follow Jesus' example, or the example of the early church, then it's pretty clear that we ought to share other sorts of meals with one another, too. Meals where we can gather around a shared table and look one another in the eye and have a good conversation with one another. Meals where we can enjoy one another's company. In fact, did you know that that's what "company" means? It probably comes from the word companion, which in turn comes from the latin phrase *com panis* or "with bread". In other words, in the *company* of one another, we break bread together!

One of the hardest things about the past couple of years, I think, has been what it's done to our fellowship—our companionship—in the church. Out of a sincere Christian desire to protect the health and lives of the most vulnerable ones among us, we found that we needed to stop simply eating together the way we did in the past. I want to be absolutely clear: I am not saying that decision was wrong at any point. But I am eagerly looking forward to being able to gather together that way once more. Fellowship like that is a sign that we are a part of each other's lives beyond simply sitting quietly in the same room for an hour on Sunday morning.

I understand, too, that things won't go back to normal right away just because I want them to. At this point, though, I'll take any little bit of normal I can get! If you're comfortable doing so, I hope you will, too.

Beginning Wednesday, March 9th we will have our traditional Lenten "soup suppers" each Wednesday night of Lent, followed by Holden Evening Prayer. This year, as part of my agreement to teach the preaching class at Wartburg Seminary, we will have

New Business:

- Lent schedule: St. John's will host 3 midweek services March 9, March 23, and April 6; St. Paul's, March 16 & 30. They will begin at 7:00 p.m. and will be conducted by a student of the seminary, arranged by the seminary, as Pastor Will is teaching during those times. Soup suppers, when held, will begin at 6:00 p.m. The first soup supper will be held at St. John's by the council families on Wednesday, March 9...
- Pastor read a copy of his proposed pastoral and congregational goals for 2022: Pastor has identified four areas of concentration and his goals for success in the areas of: Worship, Faith Formation and Inner Mission, Administration and Outer Mission, and lastly, Pastoral Care. Council members gave feedback and agreed it was a good outline with achievable goals providing there is good congregational support. He was also given some verbal feedback on ideas he may want to incorporate into his ministry for 2022 which included community involvement and presence. A copy of these goals will be attached to the minutes and can be reviewed by any member by reaching out to Pastor or St. John's secretary.

Old Business: Pastor asked if the plates could return to being brought forth during that time of worship. Only one plate needs to come forward he indicated, and the other could stay in the back. The group unanimously agreed, and it can begin as soon as the second Sunday in February.

Housing Allowance: Annually, Pastor indicates his intentions to designate a portion of his salary to housing allowances, and he would like to set this year's allowance at \$4,500.

Installation of Officers: Pastor would like to install the 2022 officers on Sunday February 13 during worship. The group was in agreement that would work for those who could attend.

Parish Intern & Salem Discussion: Lynn Sanders gave a recap of the meeting he, Mark Hueneke and Salem's President, Erik Rockwell, held in January to discuss the WTS internship program and the potential shared pastoral arrangement. The intern would be a one-year intern. There aren't any interested candidates at this time for the collab-

orative agreement which is a 3-year intern scenario. Lynn Sanders will reach out to Mark Hueneke to see if a time can be arranged to speak to the logistics of this partnership, including finance topics, worship schedule and other considerations. Remaining committee members would be asked to attend and include: St. John's: Mark Hueneke, Duane Tietjen, and Julie Busch; St. Paul's: Marty Bormann, Lynn Sanders and Ruth Hingtgen.

The next joint council meeting will be Monday, May 2' at 6:30 p.m. at St. John's.

New Business: It was discussed if any other group, including confirmation families, Sunday School, women's group, or St. Paul's would like to take one of the soup suppers, they can contact Julie Busch (563-599-5968) to make plans or receive assistance in scheduling for either of the remaining two events.

Old Business:

- Pastor indicated the brass candle topper is in at the Religious Supply in downtown Dubuque where he will pick it up, and that bill will be covered from the memorial fund.
- The new Scholarship fund from the Memorial account will be provided to students attending Lutheran Colleges, and this year's recipient of that honor for \$250 in fall of 2022 will be Mariah Hueneke. It can be renewable annually (as long as the funds sustain) for four years and will be matched by Luther for a combined gift of \$500 to her for her education per year. Pastor will work with the college to get that paperwork together, and Julie Busch will notify the family and work with Memorial Treasurer, Tom Harmon, as to where and when the check can be sent.
- It was indicated we may need to boost our social media footprint, and Julie Busch will be put back on as an admin on the FB account to begin promoting the soup supper events.

Parish Intern & Salem Discussion: The council was in agreement that it is imperative to see the cost breakdowns and the anticipated schedule of worship and shared arrangements soon in order to have an informed discussion and share details with the congregation.
